Before that, he was executive director of Lovett Peter's think-tank, the Pioneer Institute. He became a friend of CLT when he worked for our Prop 2½ ally, the Massachusetts High Technology Council, from 1981-84. In between, he received a Master's Degree in Management from Northwestern's Kellogg School. He has a BA in English from Harvard College.

Charlie was raised in Needham and lives with his wife Lauren and three children in Swampscott, where he presently serves as selectman. He also serves on the boards of the Kenneth B. Schwartz Center, the Greater Boston Chamber of Commerce, and America's Health Insurance Plans, chairing the Board of the Massachusetts Association of Health Plans. He is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Rose Kennedy Greenway Conservancy.

He has recently decided not to run for Governor of Massachusetts in 2006 but plans to run for that office when his children are older. He is a key player in the ongoing health care reform debate.
